Course Abstract

Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC) devices are often recommended following a comprehensive evaluation of a user's needs to find the most appropriate device and language system. The AAC evaluation often includes several trial periods with different speech generating devices (SGDs) to find the best fit for the AAC user. However, the AAC user may change therapy teams several times during his or her lifespan, interacting with different therapists who will all have different comfort levels with the recommended SGD. At times, it may feel easier for the team to change the system if it is unfamiliar to them. However, when system overhauls are made without careful consideration, they can disrupt the user's language development and communication. What should be our approach when we are unfamiliar with a user's AAC system? How can we adapt our current AAC systems to best suit the AAC user if we are not seeing progress? What can we do if the recommended SGD really is not the best fit? This session explores the importance of honoring the systems AAC users already know and trust, rather than replacing the system with something new. We'll discuss strategies for adapting and evolving AAC systems to better support users by exploring existing device features and how to make adjustments to meet the user where they are. We will also explore some options on what to do if their AAC system really isn't the right fit. Device demonstrations will feature PRC-Salttillo products and language systems.
