The Institute for Speech-Language Pathology (ISLP) at Widener University is a program dedicated to training clinically competent, ethical, community focused, and culturally respectful speech-language pathologists; community service and civic engagement are at the core of its mission and programmatic vision. In 2021, the ISLP opened the Speech-Language Pathology (SLP) Clinic within the Chester Community Clinic, which plays a crucial role in addressing healthcare disparities by providing free services to the community and serving as a practical training ground for students. The ISLP actively sought to establish partnerships with local organizations to better understand and serve the needs of the Chester, PA community, while simultaneously identifying diverse and authentic opportunities for clinical education through a service-learning framework (Jacoby, 2015). Given the widespread need for high quality care and potential barriers to providing services at their facilities, the SLP Clinic established and has sustained six mutually beneficial community partnerships, each serving a unique subset of the community. This seminar will (1) define a framework for identifying and establishing effective partnerships between community organizations and university clinical education programs; (2) describe the impact of strategic clinical partnerships on student learning and community health outcomes; (3) identify key strategies for successfully sustaining and strengthening partnerships over time.
